From Your Temporary Shepherd



As we turn the seasonal page into Advent, I am often reminded of a song that Simon and Garfunkel released in 1966, 7 O'clock News/Silent Night. It was a blending of the popular carol with a reading in the background of news items about the Vietnam War, interracial violence, political tensions, and drugs as the volume of the speaker's voice gradually increased. It was a powerful picture of the times — the heavenly peace of Jesus' birth against the backdrop of real-world news. (If you're too young to remember or want a refresher, check it out on YouTube.) Early in my ministry I used the song in Christmas services for several years, until it became less relevant. Unfortunately, that was not because wars and violence had ceased, but because the memory of the original number, and even the singers, was fading.

The news continues to bring us similar stories, and as we prepare for the journey to Bethlehem, the hope of Christ's peace is a stark contrast to

terrorism and the news of international and national tensions. How do we celebrate Christmas in the midst of the world we live in? Where are the hope — the peace — the joy — the love? Is this whole journey, this story, just a fairy tale?

That is what the Advent season is all about. This is a time when we focus on God's sacrificial love and how God revealed that love — by sending not a warrior with flaming sword and heavily armed troops, but a helpless newborn. Jesus was dependent on others from the very beginning; he fled for his life while he was still in diapers, and he grew up in a real family living in a small town in an occupied country. He knew how the world was — and in giving his life, he reminded us that love is still stronger than hate, and the way to peace comes not through the world's power, but through God's. Even for Christ's people, that's not an easy thing to remember.

So during the next few weeks, as we tell and retell the Christmas story, waiting for the miracle to be revealed, I encourage you to take the opportunity to practice the spiritual disciplines of prayer and meditation, generosity and service, silence and reflection. Light the Advent candles in your own homes. Read the stories of Jesus' birth once again, from Matthew and Luke, chapters 1 and 2.

The story of how *Silent Night* came to be written is an amazing one — a perfect example of how God transforms a problem into something beautiful. (You may hear this story on Christmas Eve.) But what is even more amazing is the transformation of our hearts, our lives, our families — and our churches — when we remember, and really believe, in the power of God's love. "Be not afraid," the angels said — another thing we do well to remember this year.

I look forward to celebrating the Advent and Christmas seasons with you



Join us on December 15, when, during the morning worship service, the children will share the many talents that God has given them. Then come downstairs for lunch. We will have a birthday cake for Jesus!


Sharing with the Community

Holiday Tree-Lighting Ceremony


Join your friends and neighbors for the tree-lighting ceremony and block party in downtown Framingham on December 6 from 5 to 7:30 pm.



Setback Tree-Planting Program

The City of Framingham invites homeowners and property owners in eligible neighborhoods to participate in the revitalization of the City's Setback Tree Planting Program, designed to strengthen the community's urban forest while promoting environmental stewardship and climate resiliency. The program focuses on planting trees on private property within the 20-foot setback area adjacent to the City's right-of-way. These trees are planted at *no cost* to property owners, with the agreement that participants will water and maintain the trees to ensure their healthy growth.
